1. Welcome and Introductions

Gill German MP, Chair of the Children in Wales APPG, opened the meeting by welcoming attendees and speakers. She noted her previous role involvement with Children in Wales prior to working in local council and becoming the MP for Clwyd North.

2. Presentations

Children in Wales - Hugh Russell & Sean O'Neill

- Children in Wales is the national umbrella organisation for children's rights and wellbeing in Wales.
- Advocates for the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) and a Wales where all children's rights are fulfilled.
- Core work includes:
 - Policy and campaign work, especially via networks such as the End Child Poverty Network Cymru
 - Professional learning and training for the children's workforce

- o Participation projects through Young Wales
- Cross-sector representation (public, private, and third sectors)
- Focus on child poverty, noting Wales has the highest child poverty rate of the UK nations 31% of children live in relative poverty after housing costs.
- Called for legally binding poverty reduction targets and reform of the social security system, which is currently reserved to the UK Government.
- Emphasised collaboration across governments and agencies.

Citizens Advice Wales – Luke Young

- Almost half of those receiving debt advice in Wales are in a negative budget, many of them families with children.
- Significant proportion of support goes to single-parent households and families with young children.
- Advocated for:
 - Ending the two-child limit and benefit cap
 - Uprating Local Housing Allowance
 - Rethinking disability benefit reforms
- Emphasised that 75% of families in poverty are in working households.
- Urged a broader view of poverty that includes life opportunities, not just income thresholds.

Barnardo's Cymru – Amy Bainton

- Works with over 11,000 children and families across Wales through 50+ services.
- Increasing need for emergency support for basic items (bedding, utensils, energy).
- Research with the Bevan Foundation showed:
 - 43% of parents fear worse futures for their children

- o Over 50% of children lack confidence in achieving their goals
- Called for a Welsh Child Payment Scheme (similar to Scotland's model) to directly support families.

Save the Children Wales – Melanie Simmonds

- Focused on empowering children, families, and communities to end child poverty.
- Shared findings from a co-designed participatory project with children ("Power of Voice").
- Children voiced their hopes, as well as the impact poverty has had on their aspirations and mental health.
- Outlined four key calls to action:
 - 1. Ensure access to support
 - 2. Expand opportunities for young people
 - 3. Promote positive relationships and reduce stigma
 - 4. Create space for young voices in policymaking

3. Q&A and Member Contributions

Gill German MP

- Highlighted the complexity and opportunity of devolution in tackling child poverty.
- Emphasised the importance of changing child poverty figures, not just mitigating their impact.

Llinos Medi MP

- Stressed the need for accessible services and strong transport links, especially in rural areas.
- Highlighted the link between service access and child poverty.

Andrew Ranger MP

 Urged a focus on root causes, including infrastructure and intergenerational cycles of poverty.

Baroness Carmen Smith

- Called for intergenerational fairness in social security.
- Emphasised that children and young people are currently being left behind.

Luke Young (Citizens Advice)

- Pointed out the overlap between pensioner poverty and child poverty.
- Emphasised need for leadership and ambition in addressing child poverty at the UK level.

Hugh Russell (Children in Wales)

 Reinforced the message that investing in social security is key to meaningful prevention.

- Members to consider ways to support a cross-government strategy on child poverty
- Continued engagement with Welsh Government's child poverty strategy process
- Ongoing support and coordination with sector organisations and networks
