
THE PROCESS

Every five years the United Nations Committee undertakes the periodic review of the UK. This assess how well the UK are doing with regard to upholding children's rights. A variety of organisations including Children in Wales are invited to submit evidence in the of reports, however a pre-session meeting also takes place where stakeholders, professionals, and young people are given the opportunity to elaborate on their points. Based on what they have read and heard throughout this process, the committee will form recommendations: steps that they feel the government and children's organisations can take to make rights a reality for all.




Used surveys and focus groups to find out about the issues affecting young people in Wales











HOW MUCH DO YOU THINK THE COST OF LIVING AFFETCS YOUNG PEOPLE LIVING IN WALES?



DO YOU THINK, IN GENERAL, THING ARE GETTING MORE EXPENSIVE OR CHEAPER NOWADAYS?




OVERARHCING THEME OF

CHILD POVERTY

Cost of living came out as the top priority during our consultations with young people. This is intrinsically linked to poverty, where financial instability starts to have an impact own children's ability to claim their rights.

Poverty can be thought of as an EDI issue, as it causes a stark disparity between people, demographics, and locations. Within our report and presentation, we wanted to emphasise this relationship. As a central recommendation, we are keen for Welsh Government and other stakeholders to take an EDI approach when developing solutions and action plans to combat child poverty.



Following the presentations from the delegations the committee asked questions, many of which were answered by young people from team Wales!

AN INSIGHT INTO

THE PRE-SESSION

During the pre-session, experts in children's rights, advocates, and young people themselves take questions from the committee based on the evidence submitted. This helps to clarify certain points and gain a more holistic understanding of the state of children's rights in the UK.

It also acts as a space for those in the meeting to shine a light on the issues most important to them, that they feel the committee should form a recommendation around.














CALL TO FULLY ADOPT THE UNCRC IN WALES

Here in Wales, we have taken some very important steps with regard to Children's Rights, such as the introducing the Children and Young Persons Measure in 2011 and the Wellbeing of Future Generations Act in 2015, however, we feel as though the next step is incorporate the UNCRC, enshrining the convention within law and policy making.

This was a major focal point within our presentation in the children's meeting, but also came up in discussions within the pre-session. The stakeholders and professionals in the room all strongly advocated for full incorporation for the whole of the UK, to ensure that all children are being given the same opportunities.




HAVING OUR
