Cyn dechrau pandemig y Coronafeirws, roedd dros 1 o bob 4 plentyn yng Nghymru yn byw mewn tldi. Roedd pobl o rai grwpiau ethnig, plant, pobl anabl, rhieni sengl, gofalywyr, pobl oedd yn byw mewn tai preifat ar rent neu'n gweithio mewn rhai sectorau, i gyd yn fwy tebygol o brofi tldi. Ers mis Mawrth 2020, mae tystiolaeth a gafwyd o waith ymchwil a wnaed gan nifer o sefydliadau yng Nghymru wedi awgrymu bod lefelau tldi plant wedi codi ac y bydd hynny'n parhau o ganlyniad uniongyrchol i'r pandemig. Roedd ein harolwg yn ceisio darganfod sut mae'r Coronafeirws wedi effeithio ar deuluoedd incwm isel a difreintiedig. Sefydliad Joseph Rowntree: Cyllideb yr Hydref – pam mae'n rhaid i ni gadw'r £20 o nawdd cymdeithasol sy'n gallu cynnal bywyd

Mae Sefydliad Joseph Rowntree (JRF) wedi cyhoeddi ei argymhellion ynghylch y cynnydd o £20 yr wythnos i'r Credyd Cynhwysol a Chredyd Treth Gweithio, sydd i fod i ddod i ben ym mis Ebrill 2021. Mae JRF yn amlygu sut mae'r £20 ychwanegol yr wythnos wedi bod yn gynhaliach i lawer, a sut mae dod ag ef i ben ym mis Ebrill yn debygol o dynnu 700,000 o bobl i dlodi. Amcangyfrifir bod 16 miliwn o bobl mewn teuluoedd a fydd yn teimlo colled o £1,040 y flwyddyn dros nos, a bydd hynny'n ergyd anghymesur i'r rhai ar yr incwm isaf a theuluoedd â phlant.

Cyfleoedd i Blant, Buttle UK: Cyflwr Tlodi Plant 2020, Adroddiad Llawn

Mae'r adroddiad hwn yn rhoi cipolwg unigryw ar effaith pandemig COVID-19 yng nghartrefi rhai o'r teuluoedd mwyaf agored i niwed yn y Deyrnas Unedig. Cynhaliwyd yr astudiaeth ansoddol hon gyda bron 1000 o weithwyr rheng flaen ar draws y wlad ar yr adeg pan ddechreuodd y cyfyngiadau symud gael eu llacio ym mis Mehefin 2020, ac mae wedi'i seilio ar arolwg o weithwyr cymorth sydd wedi bod yn rhyngweithio â theuluoedd yn feunyddiol ar hyd yr argyfwng.

Achub y Plant: Teuluoedd mewn trafferth yn suddo ymhellach i ddyled wrth i fwy na thraean ohonynt droi at elusen i fwydo a dilladu plant

Mae arolwg graddfa fawr o deuluoedd ar Gredyd Cynhwysol a Chredyd Treth Plant yn canfod bod 38% wedi cael eu gorfodi i ddibynnu ar help gan elusennau i gael bwyd a dillad yn ystod y ddau fis diwethaf, tra bod 60% wedi mynd i ddyled. Ar gyfartaledd, bu teuluoedd yn benthylu mwy na £1,700 yn ystod y ddau fis diwethaf yn unig.

Mae dros draean (38%) o'r teuluoedd dan bwysau wedi cael eu gadael mewn sefyllfa waeth fyth gan y pandemig, gyda 27% yn dweud bod fforddio bwyd yn anoddach nawr nag ym mis Ebrill, hyd yn oed.

In case you missed it: Results from Children in Wales' August 2020 survey: COVID-19 and the impact on low income and disadvantaged families

Prior to the start of the Coronavirus pandemic, over 1 in 4 children in Wales were living in poverty. People from certain ethnic groups, children, disabled people, single parents, carers, those living in private rented housing or working in certain sectors were all more likely to experience poverty. Since March 2020, evidence gained from research conducted by a number of organisations in Wales, has suggested that levels of child poverty have and will continue to rise as a direct result of the pandemic.

Our survey sought to find out how Coronavirus has impacted on low income and disadvantaged families, and given the extensive research that has already been undertaken in Wales, our aim was to fill the gaps in our knowledge, specifically around food insecurity; digital inclusion; and income and employment and to use the findings to inform policy change in Wales. Scheme to help tenants affected by coronavirus launches in Wales.

A new £8 million Welsh Government Tenancy Saver Loan scheme to help tenants struggling with rent arrears due to coronavirus launched Minister for Housing and Local Government Julie James announced.

First of its kind in the UK, the Tenancy Saver Loan scheme will be open to private rented sector tenants in rent arrears and those who may also struggle to pay future months' rent as a result of coronavirus; it will be open until March 31st 2021.

Managed by Wales Council for Voluntary Action, the loans will be provided by seven Credit Unions across Wales.

Joseph Rowntree Foundation: Autumn Budget - why we must keep the £20 social security lifeline

Joseph Rowntree Foundation has published its recommendations surrounding the £20 per week uplift to Universal Credit and Working Tax Credit, which is due to end in April 2021. JRF highlights how the extra £20 per week has been a lifeline to many, and how ending it in April will likely pull 700,000 people into poverty. It is estimated that 16 million people are in families that will feel an overnight loss of £1,040 per year, disproportionately hitting those on the lowest incomes and families with children.

Chances for Children, Buttle UK: The State of Child Poverty 2020, Full Report

This report provides a unique insight into the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic inside the homes of some of the most vulnerable families in the UK. This qualitative study of nearly 1000 nationwide frontline workers was carried out at the point lockdown restrictions started being lifted in June 2020 and is based on a survey of support workers who have been interacting daily with families throughout the crisis.

Save The Children: Struggling families sink deeper into debt as more than a third turn to charity to feed and clothe children

Large-scale survey of families on Universal Credit and Child Tax Credit finds 38% have been forced to rely on help from charities for food and clothes in the past two months, while 60% have gone into debt. On average, families borrowed over £1,700 in the last two months alone.

More than a third (38%) of hard-pressed families have been left even worse off by the pandemic, with 27% reporting that they're finding it even harder to afford food now than in April.

New Project: Covid Realities

The project is a partnership between the universities of York, Birmingham and Child Poverty Action Group, and is funded by the Nuffield Foundation.

The project works directly with parents and carers to find out what life is really like for families who are struggling to make ends meet during the pandemic, and to partner with them to develop and put forward recommendations for change to policy makers.

COVID Realities is looking to work with parents and carers who have children under the age of 19. People can get involved by logging onto the project website, where they can leave a diary entry, audio or video message about how they're managing, and share their ideas for change.
