The Price of Pupil Poverty Mini Guide now available: As part of the support for schools and children during COVID-19, Children in Wales have released a mini guide to support The Price of Pupil Poverty guides for Schools in Wales. The mini guide is relevant to the current situation and is essentially a reminder for schools in how they can continue to help pupils from low income and disadvantaged families during Covid -19 in line with the main price of pupil poverty guides released by welsh government. Policy, Research and Information

Impact of COVID-19 on the BAME Community and Voluntary Sector in Wales – New Survey Launched. The Coronavirus (COVID-19) crisis has had a significant impact on BAME individuals, and we are also starting to acknowledge the impact on the community and voluntary sector in the UK, including here in Wales. The recent report by [The Ubele Initiative](#) showed that close on 9 out of 10 BAME micro and small community and voluntary organisations could close within three months as a result of the pandemic.

The Ethnic Minorities and Youth Support Team Wales (EYST), working with partners, has commissioned a study to help better understand the impact of the pandemic on BAME community and voluntary organisations in Wales. If you’re working in a BAME community and voluntary organisation[1] in Wales, we would like to hear from you. Your participation will help us to:

- build a more accurate picture of the concerns and impact of the pandemic during, and as lock down measures begin to ease;
- capture the ways in which BAME community groups and organisations are working innovatively, and seeking to provide services and support to Wales’ BAME residents during this period of crisis;
- inform key funders and policy-makers on how they respond to the crisis with respect to the impact on BAME communities and organisations.

The survey is being supported by and disseminated via Race Alliance Wales, a coalition of individuals and organisations working towards Race Equality in Wales. Children’s Commissioner for Wales – No Wrong Door: This report is about how children and their families who seek support for a range of needs often find that they have to navigate a very complex system, may fall through gaps where there are no services to meet their needs, or be on a waiting list for a long time only to be told that they were waiting in the wrong queue, or have been knocking on the wrong door all along. The Commissioner and her team believe that services should wrap around families, rather than them having to fit into what is out there, and that help should be provided as early as possible to prevent more serious problems developing. Lessons from Lockdown: A survey carried out by the two largest children’s charities in Wales has revealed that 85% of school staff fear their pupils’ mental health has been affected by lockdown. More than 70% of those surveyed called for extra training for staff and the same proportion said they would need help with their own mental health and well-being. Some teachers said they had found supporting

children at home on the phone each day emotionally draining and expected to return to school feeling exhausted. Barnardo's Cymru and Action for Children Cymru are calling for a stronger frontline response. [Lessons from lockdown can be read in full here.](#)

[Meet the Funder: Children in Need](#) - Following on from the success of the Big Night In and match funding from the UK Government, Children in Need have launched the Covid-19 Next Steps Grant. The Next Steps programme is BBC Children in Need's response programme designed to deliver support for children and young people affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible organisations will be able to apply for up to £80,000 for projects commencing in September 2020. These grants can last up to 18 months. It is designed for established organisations who are already delivering work in their communities and further afield. WCVA are pleased to host James Bird, National Officer for BBC Children in Need Wales, for an online Meet the Funder event. James will present on the Next Steps Grant and take part in a Q&A session with attendees. Attendance is free.

[Save the Children and the Joseph Rowntree Foundation have released a new report called A lifeline for our children: Strengthening the social security system for families with children during this pandemic.](#) This is a joint mission to ensure families are supported through the lockdown and beyond it, and to prevent increasing numbers of children being pulled into poverty. JRF and Save the Children are calling for an urgent increase of £20 per week to the child element of Universal Credit and Child Tax Credit to help families stay afloat during this crisis. Information released by the ONS on 12th June reveal there have been nearly double the number of coronavirus deaths in the most deprived areas of Wales, between 1st March and 31st May: 109.5 per 100,000 in the most deprived areas, compared to 57.5 per 100,000 in the least deprived areas. [Coronavirus and Me: The Results](#) – Sally Holland, The Children's Commissioner for Wales has published an overview of the main results from the Coronavirus and Me survey, which over 23,700 young people aged 3-18 took part in. The survey will be used by the Welsh Gov-
